Early Intervention

Early Intervention (EI) is the services and supports that are available to babies and young children with developmental delays and disabilities and their families until age 3. These supports may include speech therapy, occupational therapy, developmental therapy, physical therapy, etc.

Early Intervention is under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) with The Department of Human Services.

The Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) outlines the supports and EI services that your child and your family may receive.

Where is EI Available?

Early Intervention programs are available in every state and territory. These publicly funded programs provide services for free here in Arkansas.

These services can be provided in different settings including at home, in private daycares, in public funded daycares, etc.



Eligibility for EI services is based on an evaluation of your child's skills and abilities. If you, or your child's doctor, or other care provider is concerned about your child's development, ask to be connected to Arkansas' Early Intervention Program. Here in Arkansas, it is First Connections. A doctor's referral is not necessary to access services.

- For initial eligibility determination infants and toddlers with disabilities and their families participate in a comprehensive, multidisciplinary child and family evaluation and assessment process.



A service coordinator will help develop and implement the IFSP An evaluator for the EI services will complete assessments of the child and family's needs


The service provider for the EI services will also be present




What is in an IFSP?

- Family input
- The present levels of function and needs of your child
- Results or outcomes expected
- The EI services your child may receive
- When, where, and how long the EI services will be provided
- The process for your child to transition out of EI services into public school or other programs
